GIG WORKER & MUSICIAN RELIEF ADDENDUM TO THE EMERGENCY RELIEF BILL

Dear Mayor Muriel Bowser and The Council of Washington DC:

We understand that this letter comes late in a rapidly-evolving process, but we hope that you will consider a Creative Inclusion Addendum to the city's planned emergency legislation. There are thousands of musicians in DC that are in need of public assistance, and we want to make sure the artists and musicians who make this city so special are not forgotten.

Listen Local First DC and members of the DC Music community are aware that the Mayor's office and the Council will be taking emergency measures to help local businesses and residents impacted by the shutdowns and quarantines associated with COVID-19. We urge you to give special consideration to the city's musicians and creatives, who are their own local businesses and will suffer greatly from an abrupt and severe loss of work due to venue closings and tour cancellations. We suggest that the Mayor and the Council consider a creative inclusion addendum to their emergency legislation. Below we have outlined some of the most pressing needs we have heard articulated by our fellow musicians and members of the DC music community. We hope these suggestions will be included in any emergency legislation.

Why is musicians/ artist inclusion important?

Musicians rely on public gatherings more than almost any other creative discipline. A majority of DC-based musicians derive a significant amount of their personal income from live performance

and music industry employment. According to the DC Music Census¹ data, over 35% of the musicians living and working in Washington DC rely exclusively on live performance and regular gigs for all of their personal income. We have been hearing accounts of financial struggle from the music community over the last week. With zero gig income, some artists have been forced to leave town, abandoning leases and rent, to live with their families. Spring is the number one time for artist touring, and we have heard from dozens of bands whose national and even international tours have been cancelled. We have seen artists quit their alternate sources of income to prepare for a tour, only to have those tours cancelled — leaving the artists with no safety net. We know of artists who have purchased merchandise for tours that are no longer happening, accruing losses and debt that they will no longer be able to make up. But the most common stories come from artists who regularly perform around town and gig 3-5 times a week to pay for rent, food, and living expenses — and who now have zero income to rely on, and almost no safety net.

Spring is festival season, and musicians from this area derive a significant amount of revenue from performing events and festivals throughout the springtime. With the new public gathering advisories from the CDC², all of those events are now being cancelled and artists are finding themselves with zero future income. Cancellations and public gathering restrictions are beginning to extend up to 12 weeks from now, and thousands of musicians and creatives will find themselves in even greater economic hardship in the weeks to come.

These considerations do not even account for local music venues, who mostly fall under the same restrictions being imposed on restaurants and bars throughout the city. These venues, many of which cannot subsist on carry out and food delivery revenue, are closing their doors, not knowing if they will be able to open again. For these small locally-owned venues that are not a part of larger restaurant and business management groups, we hope the city is considering everything from rent and mortgage abatement to compensation for staff, paid leave, and even mitigation funding from loss of revenue from cancelled events.

Below we have listed the primary needs of musicians, creatives, and even some of the businesses that regularly serve gig workers and musicians.

FOR GIG WORKERS & MUSICIANS

Emergency Housing Rent & Mortgage Relief - A monthly pre-established sum or payment equal to the median rent for Washington DC for the musicians left without any source of income and ability to cover rent or mortgage payments. Musicians can apply through a designated form

where they show that the majority of their income comes from gig related activities that have now been cancelled.

Food Relief - At least \$200 a month per musician through Food Stamp programs or SNAP to allow for musicians with no more gig income to pay for food.

Temporary Health/Dental Insurance - Temporary coverage for healthcare premiums or free basic health care coverage for the next couple of months for uninsured artists or those in need of emergency or ongoing medical assistance.

Bill Payment Support - We understand that the city is in communication with PEPCO to defer payment of bills for the next couple of months, though without any income and if the public gathering restrictions continue this may become a deferred debt that becomes insurmountable for many.

Remit All Delayed DCCAH Artist Grant Funding - A couple of artists have written to us and said that some of their DCCAH grant funding has not been received yet. We know that this process can take a while, but we ask that any 2019 grant funding that has not yet been remitted to event organizers or individual artists be delivered on an accelerated timeline.

Childcare Support - A number of musicians, especially those with younger children, have reached out about childcare concerns. Due to school closures, many of these children are now home from daycare yet parents must continue to pay daycare. These parents are seeking some form of temporary financial relief to continue to pay for daycare while they are no longer receiving any income.

Institute a Disaster Unemployment Initiative - A Disaster Unemployment Benefit would be an excellent way to disseminate funding to all freelance employees and contractors as well as musicians and creatives. Disaster Unemployment Assistance is an initiative that already exists and has worked in other jurisdictions. It is a program that can be accounted for, administered fairly easily and serve an extremely vulnerable population during this time.

FOR LOCAL VENUES AND EVENT ORGANIZERS

We have communicated with a number of local venues and business owners and some of the primary needs are.

- Assistance with Paid Leave and Unemployment Insurance
- Assistance with Rent & Mortgage payments
- Deferment of Bills
- Get the Performance Promotion Amendment Legislation Form Up on the OTR Website -It has been months and this form is still not available.
- Grants to cover lost business expenses

- Deferral of Business Taxes
- Tax credit to support the staff (tipped workers)

We understand that the Mayor's Office and the city council have already created a plan to address many of these needs. But many music-related local businesses being most deeply affected by our current crisis are the nonprofits and other organizations hosting events and festivals. The Wammies, Made in the DMV Conference, TLF's Creative Entrepreneurs Summit, Damaged City Fest and hundreds of other events have been cancelled or postponed. Some of the city's signature art and culture events happen in the Spring; cancelling these events will not only be devastating for local businesses and the musicians who make these events so special, but also for the organizers and nonprofits behind them.

Mitigation Funding - We ask that the city devise a structure of mitigation funding to help these businesses, nonprofits, and events organizers who have lost significant amounts of revenue from event cancellation. Most event insurance policies do not provide compensation for these types of Force Majeure cancellations. Many event organizers, producers, and local businesses have already incurred an incredible amount of debt prior to the cancellation of their events and now have no way to recoup their losses.
